
New Research: Military Teens Well-Being and Our Future Force

In October, the <u>National Military Family Association</u> and <u>Bloom: Empowering Military Teens</u> released the results of a first-of-its-kind <u>survey</u> of 2,000 military children ages 13 to 19, rating their experiences. The data showed that 48% of military teenagers show signs of emotional distress. Forty-two percent of survey respondents reported having low mental well-being; 45% scored moderate in mental well-being which is still considered at risk. Only 13% of military teens scored in the high mental well-being range.

Well-being and psychological functioning were measured using the Warwick-Edinburgh Mental Well-Being Scale (WEMWBS). The report states that, "according to the Centers for Disease Control, " [b]uilding stong bonds and relationships with adults and friends at school, at home, and in the community provides youth with a sense of connectedness. This feeling of connectedness is important and can protect adolescents from poor mental health ..." However, the survey showed that most military children struggle to establish connectedness due to frequent military moves, deployments and separations.

Furthermore, an overwhelming majority, 65%, of military teenagers plan to serve in the military, compared to only 13% of civilian teens. The future of America's volunteer force relies upon these military teenagers' wellbeing. 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Why Boarding School?

What stable educational experiences offer military teens

Modern-day boarding schools are nothing like the stuffy, privileged institutions portrayed in movies and television. To the contrary, today's boarding schools are vibrant, diverse, closely-knit communities offering students transformative educational experiences. According to data from The Association of Boarding Schools (TABS) and the National Association of Independent Schools (NAIS), boarding school students (compared to public school and private day students) are more satisfied; feel more supported; have higher quality teachers; are better prepared for college; spend less time watching TV; spend more time competing in sports, playing music and doing homework; and are more academically challenged.
